HUNDREDS COME OUT IN SUPPORT OF BREAKFAST WITH THE INN CROWD

Room at the Inn's sixth annual Breakfast with the INN Crowd, held Friday, April 11, was a resounding success, with more than 320 guests attending the event and showing their support for Room at the Inn's work with the homeless in the St. Louis area.

"With this year's breakfast, we wanted to make a stand for our youngest clients-the children of Room at the Inn," said Development Director Ana G. Schulz. "All of us at Room at the Inn were impressed and humbled with the show of support for this year's gala."

The breakfast, held at the St. Louis Renaissance Airport Hotel, featured several speakers on the subject of homelessness, including Karen Wallensak, Executive Director of Catholic Charities Community Services, who gave a sobering account of homelessness in the area.

"Children are among what the National Center on Family Homelessness calls 'America's Youngest Outcast,"" Wallensak said during her presentation. "The average age of a homeless child is six years old."

Wallensak highlighted the work that

shelters like Room at the Inn do every day to fight homelessness.

"When you step back and look at the amount of work that goes on in places like Room at the Inn, it's almost miraculous what these shelters can accomplish," she said.

But it is not a job that can be done alone.

"Room at the Inn's mission is only

possible thanks to the hundreds of people who stepped up to the plate to help those who need it most," said Program Director Valorie Ferlis.

CLIENT SUCCESS STORY: A TIME FOR RENEWAL

Spring is a time of change and renewal. Now as summer approaches and spring slowly comes to an end, we see how the trees have sprouted their leaves and flowers have blossomed. Similarly, at Room at the Inn, we see every day how our clients grow personally as they find solutions to their homelessness.

One of the families currently staying with us is a wonderful example of the new beginnings Room at the Inn can provide to the less fortunate.

Our client Chris, his wife and two-year-old son arrived at our shelter almost a month ago with measured hope and many fears.

Chris said prior to Room at the Inn, he and his family were staying with relatives at an apartment. Then the landlord called. The apartment they were living in had an occupancy limit which they were violating.

Jobless, with a second child on the way, and no place to stay, everything seemed to be going in the wrong direction.

Then, his wife decided to call the Catholic Charities' Homeless Hotline, which refers clients to shelters like Room at the Inn.

"It was scary," Chris said. "We didn't know anybody. We did not know what to expect."

Upon arrival at Room at the Inn, however, Chris said the shelter gave him a chance to start over and work hard to change his condition.

"I just kept thinking, 'I need to take care of my family. I can't move backwards. I need to keep moving forward," Chris explained.

While working with Room at the Inn's employment program specialist, Chris was offered a job at a manufacturing company. In his application letter, Chris was not embarrassed by his current condition but, rather, empowered by the possibilities of making a positive change.

"In my cover letter I basically told them I had a family and that we were in a homeless shelter," Chris said. "I told them I needed to be a man and take care of my family and provide for them. The hiring manager said she called me because of my cover letter and said she wanted to give me a chance."

Now with a job, Room at the Inn is helping Chris find permanent or transitional housing. Chris said this experience has helped him understand that life is never over if you don't give up.

"You just have to pray and strive to always go forward," Chris said. "You have to have faith and keep searching. Everything changes for the better, if you make it happen."

GLENDALE PRESBYTERIAN CELEBRATES 20 YEARS OF SERVICE TO AREA HOMELESS

On Sunday, May 4th, Glendale Presbyterian Church celebrated 20 years of partnering with Room at the Inn in its mission to help the homeless women, children and families of the St. Louis area.
